Our goal is to develop amputee hockey for both recreation and competitive play

We help amputees to get over their impairments, and participate in sports. Sports can significantly increase self-esteem levels of athletes with a disability.



## Canadian Amputee Hockey Committee (CAHC) Mission Statement

The Canadian Amputee Hockey Committee (CAHC) is a committee of the non-profit Canadian Amputee Sports Association (CASA), proud members of the Canadian Paralympic Committee (CPC), that has been organized for the purpose of promoting ice hockey for amputees regardless of age, gender, race or physical ability.

The CAHC conducts annual recreation training camps and games. As well, there is a focused effort promoting youth camps each year, along with a national team program. The CAHC's goals are beginning to become realities, with awe-inspiring results. We held a Canadian/American youth camp in October 2003, with great participation from tomorrow's amputee superstars. ### The CAHC goals are:

- To outreach to all amputees across Canada and encourage them to "Put their Disability on Ice";
- To establish CAHC contacts in each province across Canada;
- To recruit more amputees World Wide to play Standing Ice Hockey;
- To continue to develop the Standing Ice Hockey internationally through World Amputee Ice Hockey Championships and events, with at least four nations being represented;
- To fulfill the requirements to allow Amputee Standing Ice Hockey to be recognized as a full medal sport by the International Paralympic Committee, IPC;
- To be full members of Hockey Canada by 2009;
- To continue to dominate the world in the sport of Amputee Standing Ice Hockey
